Every time a **course or program** is registered via the **online survey** on the ISBM homepage, the corresponding overview is **immediately updated**.


The **Education and Training Committee** of the ISBM set up these links after conducting a **survey** of 124 members of behavioral medicine societies worldwide. Most survey participants were PhD-qualified, university academics based in Europe, US, and Asia/Pacific regions. Behavioral medicine was now part of other disciplines, mostly psychology, public health and medicine. Most saw **behavioral medicine as developing further in the future**.

Mission


The ISBM Education and Training Committee mission is to facilitate international cooperation in education and training within the field of behavioral medicine. Our primary focus is to support early career researchers and establish e-learning in behavioral medicine.

International Survey 2011

Online survey links were sent to key ISBM members (n=91; 58% response rate), and forwarded to general members (n=243; 29% response). Questions were asked on individual demographics, definition of the field, the status of behavioral medicine in the respondent's country and any responsibility for education and training.



Respondents by geographical area (*n*=124).




The future of Behavioral Medicine (n=124).

Defining Behavioral Medicine

Qualitative analysis (n=97) yielded the following major themes:

- 1. An interdisciplinary field that provides a holistic bio-psychosocial view on health-related treatment.
- The relation between behavior (psychological factors) and somatic illness.
- 3. Research and practice to promote behavioral changes in connection to somatic illness.
